SPECULATIVE FUTURES

Speculative Futures asks what the futures of plastic might be. In light of recent innovations in plastics, including 3D printing, and increasing knowledge about the global ubiquity of plastic in the food chain, what kinds of unintentional consequences, beneficial and not, might plastic be heralding in? What worlds are we inadvertently birthing and what new forms of life and materials might emerge from our present moment?

Like many contemporary sculptors, Pennsylvania-based BONNIE COLLURA searches for materials that suit her artistic practice. Urethane liquid plastic has served her well in the casting of large-scale figurative pieces, far less expensive than bronze to be sure and able to withstand the elements when installed outdoors. Brushed into flexible rubber molds, the so-called "machine" plastic yields a detailed, durable cast that can then be drilled, milled, or sanded without fear of breaking. In Imperceptible Rupture: A More Perfect Union (2015), Collura explores the viability of using non-toxic casting materials, namely agua resin, though the considerable weight and expense of that water-based composite make it much less desirable and flexible as a casting material.
